

Hospice Care



What is it?

Hospice care focuses on the care, comfort, and quality of life of a person with a serious illness who is approaching the end of life. Comfort care and support for the family continue when a patient joins hospice care, but attempts to cure the person's illness are stopped.

Why might a patient start hospice care?

At some point, it may not be possible to cure a serious illness, or a patient may choose not to undergo certain treatments. Patients who begin hospice care understand that their illness is not responding to attempts to cure it or slow its progress.

How does a patient begin hospice care?

Hospice is provided for a patient with a terminal illness whose doctor believes he or she has six months or less to live if the illness runs its natural course.

Who is part of the hospice care team?

The care team includes nurses, doctors, social workers, spiritual advisors, and trained volunteers. Everyone works together with the patient, caregiver and/or family to provide medical, emotional, and spiritual support.

Where is hospice care provided?

It can be offered at home, or in facilities such as a nursing home, hospital, or hospice center. It may be covered by Medicare or other insurance companies. Contact your insurance company to find out if
