

JOINT INJECTIONS




TYPES

- Steroid injections: medicine is injected into the joint to treat inflammation and decrease swelling and pain
- Viscosupplementation: a gel-like fluid is injected into the joint to act as lubricant and shock absorber



TIMING

- Improvement is fast but not permanent
- You should not get more than one shot every six weeks
- You should not get more than three to four shots a year



ASPIRATION

Removing fluid from a joint may help relieve pressure and diagnose certain inflammatory (infection, gout, rheumatoid arthritis) and non-inflammatory (trauma, osteoarthritis) conditions



SIDE EFFECTS

- Flare (temporary joint swelling and pain hours after injection)
- Local depigmentation (loss of color from skin) and fat atrophy (thinning of skin)
- Allergic reaction
- Infection
